## My Centurion Year

The Centurion Achievement Challenge is a Special Program that challenges a walker to complete 100 events in a calendar year. In 2023, I completed Centurion for the third time.

My first walk of the year was New Year's Day, the South Carolina Capital Walk in Columbia. My last was on New Year's Eve in Parowan, Utah. In between, I walked 105 events in 29 states from Florida to Washington. I love to travel and completing Centurion gave me an excuse to chase other Special Programs. I completed the Border Crossing Special program. Many of these border crossings were in the Washington / Oregon / Idaho area. None of them were in the upper Midwest. I completed Walking the USA A - Z, a program to walk in a city with a name starting with each letter of the alphabet. I completed this program for the second time, this time going through the alphabet in order just to make it more of a challenge. I completed the six books of the Walking with America's Veterans (I have since learned there are now 8 books). I'm almost finished with the Walking the United States, both the States and Capitals books, with only Hawaii left. I completed the 24 walks in the Dairyland Walkers VIP Program. Arizona, Utah and Nevada have Special Programs to complete a walk in each County Seat. I completed Arizona in 2022. I completed 10 of the Utah County seats in 2023 and hope to complete Utah and Nevada in 2024.

There were walks I loved for a variety of reasons. In Mobile, AL, I found myself unexpectedly on the sidelines of Mardi Gras parade. I walked through a snowstorm and six inches of new snow in Hastings, MN. I fell in love with Boise, ID after walking three walks in it's downtown parks. I loved completing walks on segments of the Ice Age Trail. One of my favorite walks was along the Missouri River in Atchison, KS. I'm an aviation buff and enjoyed finding the birthplace of Amelia Earhart. I was amazed to find a Veterans' Memorial a relic display from the USS Arizona.

There were walks that didn't go as expected. Big Springs State Park in Florida had been ravaged by a hurricane and parts of the route were closed due to storm damage but I was able to piece together a walk with road segments. The trail at Sinks Canyon in Lander, Wyoming was closed due to a rampaging moose who was chasing hikers. I had to shift my walk further up the canyon.

There were walks I disliked. Ft Walton Beach, FL sounded promising but in reality it was a slog through sand on a crowded beach. I looked forward to a walk in Billings, MT but a good section of the trail was along a crowded highway with no shoulder. It felt dangerous.

The worst were the walks that didn't happen for technical reasons. On two occasions, I drove hours to get to a walk only to find the Walk Box was unavailable. In one instance, the walk box was locked in the manager's office and the manager was on vacation. In another, the POC had pulled the box thinking the sanction had ended in October but the AVA web site had them listed through the end of the year. I'd like to advocate for the On-Line Walk Box.

I would like to thank the AVA, Dairyland Walkers and all the people that make these events happen. We need more walks to give more people the opportunity to get outside. We need more Special Programs to help people find places they will love but ordinarily would never think to visit. Year 2023 was a good for me. I'm looking forward to my next Centurion.
